NAPLAN Testing

NAPLAN testing approaches, and I appreciate the dedication of our staff in preparing our students. Last year's success motivates us to continue excelling in teaching and learning. While important, we don't spend lots of time on this test nor do we "teach to the test". For our school, it captures quality Christian teaching and learning for all students. This year we will be able to measure the progress of our students as we can compare the 2022 test results to the 2024 test results. This usual measure was disrupted by the pandemic. The progress made over 2 years by our students is something that I would like to celebrate more and to recognise the hard work of our staff, students and parents in supporting their students learn to their very best ability.

Capital Works

New capital works are underway, including preparations for the second stage of our basketball court. Over \$150,000 is budgeted to our sound system upgrade in Pioneer Hall in time for the musical 'The Sound of Music' and end of year events. I thank the Board for their support with these upgrades and strategic planning in these matters.

Last Thursday we enjoyed a captivating and informative presentation from Dr Ron Neller, Geomorphologist and Creation Ministries International speaker, who presented compelling evidence that a



global flood was responsible for the formation of fossils. He certainly captivated our students who went away challenged and excited about what they had learnt. I had one Year 10 boy who came up to me afterwards saying; "That was so good! I normally find it hard to pay attention to guest speakers, but I listened to everything he had to say." At ACC, whilst we present evolutionary theory as part of the National Curriculum, we always ensure that our students are presented with evidence and teaching that points to a worldview that we were designed and created by God and to hear the good news that the biblical account of origins is not only historically accurate, but makes better sense of the evidence.

Elevate Education Study Skills Workshops



Last week we had Elevate Education come to run study skills workshops for our Years 7, 10, 11 & 12 students. Whilst Elevate has been partnering with us for a number of years, this was the first time that we have delivered a formal workshop with our Year 7's. And all indications are that is was well-received, with 98% of students indicating on their feedback form that they would recommend it to their peers and that it was time well spent.

Compassion Child Sponsorship Free Dress Day Wednesday 6th March

Wednesday 6th March is a uniform free day to raise funds for our Compassion Child Sponsorship. Students who dress out of uniform are to bring a gold coin donation.



For safety reasons, several of the regular clothing guidelines cannot be relaxed on Uniform Free Days. In particular:

- Shoulders and midriffs must be covered (i.e. no tank tops, singlet tops or similar);
- No additional piercings (ears, brows, nose) can be worn;
- Closed-in shoes are still to be worn and leather footwear is still required for practical classes (Building & Construction Studies, Home Economics, Hospitality, Industrial Technology & Design, Manual Arts, Visual Art, Visual Art Studies).

Students who breach these standards will be required to go home to change.

Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy. NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

All schools will be completing 2024 NAPLAN Online from 13-22 March.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools have transitioned from paper-based to computer-based assessments. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students have the opportunity to participate in the national assessment program. Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs. Please contact Bridget Price bprice@acc.qld.edu.au to discuss adjustments.



- Support the management of Child Protection matters within the College and directly advises the Principal of relevant issues as required by legislation.

The ideal applicant will have previous experience in a similar role and the following key skills:

- Be a committed Christian, active in your local church (pastoral reference required) and in full agreement with the College's evangelical Statement of Faith.
- · Ability to lead excellence in student wellbeing, student behaviour management and pastoral care.
- · Demonstrated leadership skills, mentoring of staff and collaboration with colleagues.






