We acknowledge within our newsletter this year, with love and support the members of our community who are recently married, have welcomed new life into the world and we pray for those members of our community who have entered into God's care.



FOCUS ON REUBAN BUTLER (1994-2006, College Leader 2006, College Dux 2006)

The annual College Awards Night was held on Tuesday 15th November 2022. We were delighted to welcome back past student Reuban Butler as our guest speaker. Following is a copy of Reuban's address at Awards Night:



Good evening everyone – thanks for the introduction, and for the opportunity to speak tonight.

I have very fond memories of Columba – I'll never forget the rush of running onto Monagle Oval for a footy match. It's also where I first fell in love – sneaking behind M block after class finished – much to my teachers' displeasure!

I also remember seemingly never-ending Speech Nights,

where someone like me was dishing out life lessons and we students couldn't wait to ESCAPE! I know your pain and I promise not to 'bang on' for too long.

As was mentioned earlier, I'm currently working as a doctor in Emergency on the Sunshine Coast. Getting there has been an interesting journey.

When I graduated from Columba I wasn't too sure about what I wanted to do. I considered medicine at JCU, but 6 years of study sounded like a life-sentence at the time, so I settled on a 4 year physiotherapy course in Brisbane. I was initially quite nervous about moving to the 'big smoke', and a bit intimidated by the 'city slickers' discussing their private tennis coaches and their new cars ... I didn't have a car, and I certainly wasn't getting private tennis lessons! I think Mum and Dad were a bit intimidated too ... by the cost of the on-campus student accommodation!

However, I soon realised the benefits of coming from a small boarding school in a regional community. At Columba you learn to interact with the full spectrum of people, from all different ages and backgrounds. And there's abundant opportunities to participate in sports and hobbies. I soon found out at uni, that I was the one of the few kids who could play a range of different sports — including tennis; I could handle myself okay in the debating arena; and - my city friends were astonished - I could even change a flat tyre without calling RACQ for backup ... even though I didn't own a car!

Seriously, if you see the strengths of coming from a small school in a regional town, it will give you the belief that you can make a good life: wherever you choose to go and whatever you choose to do. So have confidence in yourself!

There is a famous quote by Suzy Kassem, which rings true to me. She says: "Doubt kills more dreams than failure ever will."

There are so many times whilst studying and working that I have doubted myself; thought I wasn't up to the task. However, I have tried not to let that stop me from having a go.

Whilst working as a physio, I decided to take the entrance exam into medicine. Preparing for that exam was tough, months of late night study and I began to doubt that I had done the right thing. I had to recruit one of my ex-teachers, Mr Peck, to help me re-learn physics.

In the end, I snuck through the entrance exam and got to fulfil my dream of becoming a doctor.

So students, believe in yourself and good things will happen. And remember that you are never alone. Your parents and grandparents, and your teachers and friends have got your back! They want you to be amazing and believe that you can be.

The second thing I want to touch on tonight is respect for your fellow students. During my time in the hospital, I have seen an increasing number of young people present with mental health issues, sometimes with tragic outcomes.

School can be a tough place, particularly when you don't think you fit in with the majority. One of my biggest fears at school was being different. I remember in Grade 8 having a meltdown on Anzac Day because I had forgotten to pick up a school blazer to wear. I was so worried I would be the only person without a jacket, that I refused to go. Fortunately, my parents managed to come up with a blazer ... about 5 sizes too big. Be careful what you wish for!

But seriously, if everyone was the same – life would be oh so boring. So, celebrate your differences. In diversity, such as you have at Columba, are the riches that matter; the relationships that make our lives interesting and joyful.

And when you leave school, as the seniors will do later in the week, be reassured that there's a whole world of difference out there and, in time, you will find 'your' people.

Now, I promised not to 'bang on' for too long, so that's it from me. Be kind to each other. And believe in yourself – after all, you're Columba kids! Thank you.

John (Verch) Vecchio passed away in Home Hill on 4th February 2022. Information received from Past Student Geoff Casey (1968-1971) -

John passed away in Home Hill on 4th February, 2022, aged 66 years. Unfortunately, we have lost another Mt Carmel Old Boy. The years roll on and our number diminishes. John was an unassuming ratbag with a heart of gold who was good for a laugh or a helping hand. He was a boarder at Mt Carmel from 1969 to 1971. John and I were trained to operate and maintained the "new" pool. We fished cane toads out of the pool and made fertiliser from them which we applied to the pool lawns. These were the "jewel of North Queensland" according to Br. Murphy. (I think he was biased). It would be true to say that the quick thinking of Verch may well have saved the life of Br. McGrath when there was a mishap in the pool pump room. One of the chlorine gas regulators had failed and was leaking large quantities of chlorine gas into the pump room. Br. McGrath was overcome by the gas, but John's quick thinking enabled him to get into the pump room and shut off the gas flow. The remaining gas was neutralised, rendering the area safe. After a short stay in hospital Br. McGrath was back on deck. After this incident, we changed over to using dry powder chlorine. John was not a great academic but a genius with mechanical and practical things. He developed many design improvements on his sugar-cane harvesters that were later "borrowed" and incorporated into new model harvesters. Many of these improvements are still in use today. He and I cleaned out the old well down behind the No.1 oval scoreboard and refurbished the jack-pump that was there. The idea was to pump water for the bottom oval, and the trees planted there, rather than cart drums of water down for them. The pump worked well but for some reason we could not get an engine to drive the pump and had to resort to using the pump's large pulley as a treadmill, which didn't last long as we tired quickly - it was hard yakka!. We were both very disappointed when, at the 2002 reunion, we saw that the well had been filled in. John was a Son, a Husband, a Father, Father-in-law, Grandfather, Brother, Brother-in-law and Uncle, a man loved by many. A man Mt Carmel College can be proud to call a Son, a Carmel Man! He will live on in the hearts of many, I'm sure.
