FOCUS ON CATHERINE McCABE (nee Guilfoyle 1996-1998)

The annual College Awards Night was held on Tuesday 16th November 2021. We were delighted to welcome back past student Catherine McCabe (nee Guilfoyle) as our guest speaker. Following is a copy of Catherine's address at Awards Night:



It is my absolute pleasure to be here with you tonight.

Firstly, congratulations to all on getting through another challenging year and special congratulations to this evening's award winners for your achievements.

I am an avid supporter of Columba and have lots of fond memories but here are some of the highlights:

- I was the inaugural College Captain, when the three schools St Columba's, St Mary's and Mt Carmel amalgamated in 1998;
- I enjoyed many opportunities to represent the school in various events and have countless team sporting memories;
- I also met my best friend, Stacey Eisel (nee Collinson), at Columba;
- I met my now husband, Lance, at this school;
- And on account of that, in addition to both being proud past students, we are also now both extremely proud parents of a Columba student, Lane.

So yes, I am very proud of this school, and my connection to it. But, I did not always attend Columba.

Up until the middle of Year 10 I attended Charters Towers State High, and was and still am, very proud to have attended there. I have great memories of State High too. Our netball and softball teams were undefeated premiers in Years 8, 9 and 10 and I had a lot of friends and amazing teachers that I still always love to catch up with.

But, in Year 10, some things started to change. There were a few unsettling issues going on at both school and home, that were bubbling away under the surface and, if I'm honest, cracks were beginning to show with me - behaviourally - and let's just say, they needed some addressing.

So it came to be that one day, after one of those big cracks happened, I knew something had to change. I knew something in my life had to change significantly to help me reset, so, along with my mum's support, I made a pretty drastic choice to change schools smack-bang in the middle of high school, and go to St Mary's, now Columba.

But changing high schools is, I think, kind of a big deal and quite frankly, terrifying. Maybe some of you have experienced it yourself. And it didn't come without its doubts and heightened insecurities for me.

Would I fit in? Would I be up to speed with the classroom curriculum? Would I fall behind? Would my friends at State High stay in touch? Would everyone have more money than me? Was I asking too much of my parents financially to go to a private school? And did this spell the end of our netball reign? And also how many days of the week would I

have to wear the awful day uniform??? (They are lovely now, but any ladies out there who were at school in 1996 - you know what I mean!)

Well, I think you know the answers to these concerns already from my introduction. It all turned out better than great in the end, and I don't think I'm overstating it when I say the choice I made to attend Columba, was a sliding doors moment for me that changed the course of my life forever. But why, and how, and why was I drawn to Columba?

Well to answer these questions, I will fast-forward to my career after school, which has been based in marketing. I've worked for a number of organisations in Queensland in various marketing positions, and most recently started my own consultancy here in Charters Towers.

Marketing is a really interesting field to work in, not the least because there are so many facets to it – one of which is branding. So when reflecting on what it was about Columba that made such a difference to me, I couldn't help but look to the school's branding and its values which, then principal Mrs Norton and I can tell you, were the subject of much discussion and deliberation in 1997 as the schools prepared to amalgamate.

You see branding, is about much more than a logo. A logo is quite simply the physical representation of a brand. Branding is in fact a process - a journey if you will - that organisations use to distil what is really at the heart of what they do — what is their purpose, why are they special, what is their promise to their customer, and even if they were to be a person, what would they be like? This is called the brand persona, and takes into account the kind of characteristics, tone of voice, and even motivations and fears of the brand. And the thinking behind it is that "like attracts like." Brands who can embody the same kind of values as the people they want to attract, are generally more successful in doing so. And not only that, but create loyal customers willing to shout amazing things about them from the rooftop.

So, when I see things like the big Columba billboard on the highway coming home from Townsville, and reflect on my own experience, it is plain as day to me why I have such an affinity with Columba. The values that Columba bring to life are exactly those I wanted in my life:

- Courage: Columba rewards those who are brave to overcome their fears, and step out of their comfort zone for the purpose of achieving their potential.
- Compassion: When I came to Columba, I was rewarded with compassion and understanding and embraced with open arms, not only by the staff but students taught to do the same. I was treated with respect, and taught to have compassion and respect for myself.
- Commitment: The school emphasises its commitment to consistently supporting students, to stay focused on your goals and to persevere through life's challenges.

But branding is not just for organisations and extends to individuals too, though not usually as consciously as in the business world.



And as students of Columba who attend school for years, and are not just simply transactional customers like many brands have, I want you to take a moment to realise that, knowingly or not, you have now been gifted these beautiful values. They've been instilled in you, as part of everyday life at school.

Effectively, you've been branded Columba.

This is a blessing, but that is not where the brand journey ends for you. You have the power to choose your own brand, and take it whatever direction you want, whenever you want, and be whoever you want to be, in your own unique way that makes you special.

So, I would like to challenge you all this Christmas break, or before your next TikTok post, to take a moment to intentionally think what you want your own personal brand to be — what values are important to you, what is going to be your purpose, and promise, to yourself and others, so that you both support and attract people who share those same fundamental values into your life, and make your own brand, a roaring success.


