E-scooters and bikes

The Queensland Police Service (QPS) is continuing its strong focus on community safety by addressing unsafe behaviours associated with E-mobility devices, including

E-bikes, personal mobility devices (PMDs) or e-scooters, and electric motorbikes. In the past few years, the popularity of these E-mobility devices has grown and police have been actively engaging with the community to promote safe practices, educate users on compliance requirements, and enforce road rules. It is anticipated that with the school holidays fast approaching, there will be an increase in children riding PMDs and E-Bikes. This increased usage among vulnerable road users (including younger people) will significantly increase the risk of road trauma, namely:

E-mobility devices are not toys. They are vehicles that are subject to Queensland road safety laws.

E-bikes that can exceed a speed of 6km/h under motor power alone (without pedalling) are not a legal E-mobility device. These are considered non-compliant E-motorcycles and cannot be ridden in public.

It's essential parents and carers consider the legalities of e-scooters, as Queensland law states they cannot be operated by a person under 16 years-of-age without adult supervision, while those under 12 years of age are not legally allowed to operate them at all. Elsewhere in this newsletter you can find more detailed information about e-scooters and bikes.




