The UN **International Day of the Girl** was celebrated this week on Wednesday 11 October to highlight issues concerning the gender inequality facing young girls. This year's theme was "The Power of the Adolescent Girl: Vision for 2030". There are nearly 600 million girls aged 10 to 19 in the world today, each with limitless individual potential, however they are disappearing from public awareness and the international development agenda. Between inequities in secondary education to protection issues, adolescent girls are uniquely impacted and should benefit from targeted investments and programs that address their distinct needs. Investing in adolescent girls can have a formidable ripple effect to create a better world by 2030. At St Patrick's College we believe our girls need to be aware of the plight of so many vulnerable and disadvantaged girls and be spurred to use the privilege of their education to reach out to women to support them to harness their potential for a better future.

Student leaders were announced on Assembly this week, ahead of Speech Night. Stepping into a formal leadership role is a great honour and a great responsibility. The girls appointed to these roles, have been chosen because of their demonstrated willingness to be involved in the life of the College and because they have shown courage to lead and compassion to serve others as well as an obvious love of our school. There is an expectation that our student leaders will be strong role models and their behaviour must be beyond reproach. Being a leader means having integrity – doing the right thing when no one is watching. I hope that for many of our girls this leadership role will be the beginning of a life journey that will take them to positions of influence once they leave the safety of our school grounds. I ask you all to support the girls as they take up their leadership roles.

To the young women who put themselves forward and missed out on a role, I thank them for being risk takers. While there may not have been an opportunity this time, life will continue to present chances for each and every one of them to put themselves forward in the future.

Recipients of academic awards to be presented at **Speech Night** on Tuesday 31 October at 7pm at the Townsville Civic Theatre were announced this week on Assembly. Letters will also go home to parents notifying them that their daughter is receiving an award. We do this prior to the event in the off chance that there has been a calculation error and that a worthy recipient may have been overlooked. If this is the case, please contact Claudia Maloney-Luisis, PA to the Director of Studies so that we can double check the information. A reminder that Speech Night is a compulsory event for all students. They are to wear full academic uniform. Parents are warmly welcomed to attend.

In any given year 20% of the population is experiencing mental health issues, 45% in their lifetime. Mental Health Week is the perfect time to have an open discussion on mental health. Habits of Highly Effective Students

A common issue felt by many students at this time of year is how to keep focused until the end of the year. Last week on Assembly I spoke about ‘The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People’ by Dr Stephen R Covey, renowned educator and author. These habits can help people to succeed in life. I proposed to the students that they could apply these habits to help them prepare themselves to succeed in their studies. Dr Covey suggests that students try to develop and appreciate the following habits:

- **Take responsibility for yourself**
Recognize that in order to succeed you need to make decisions about your priorities, your time and your resources.
- **Centre yourself on your values and principles**
Don't let friends and acquaintances dictate what you consider important.
- **Put first things first**
Follow up on the priorities you have set for yourself and don't let others, or other interests, distract you from your goals.
- **Discover your key productivity periods and places**
Morning, afternoon, or evening? Find spaces where you can be the most focused and productive. Prioritize these for your most difficult study challenges.
- **Consider yourself in a win-win situation**
When you contribute your best to a class, you, your fellow students, and even your teacher will benefit. Your results can then be one additional check on your performance.
- **First understand others, then attempt to be understood**
When you have an issue with another person, try to see it from their perspective. Now ask yourself how you can best approach the issue with that person given his/her situation.
- **Look for better solutions to problems**
For example, if you don't understand the course material, don't just re-read it. Try something else. If you are not sure how, consult with the teacher, Head of Department, a classmate or form a study group.
- **Look to continually challenge yourself**

Resilient Youth Australia Survey

The College has engaged the services of Resilient Youth Australia (<http://www.resiliencyouth.org.au/>), an evidence based program that has been designed by Andrew Fuller, well known Clinical Psychologist and founding Director.

Resilient Youth Australia takes a data-based approach to measuring and building resilience, working closely with young people, schools and communities to do the same. They will assist our College to conduct a survey of our students this term using a specially designed psychometrically robust tool to ascertain the health and wellbeing status of each cohort. It is important to note that students will complete the survey **anonymously**.

Resilient Youth will provide a report based on the data which will prompt thoughtful and informed discussion about the health and wellbeing of our students and identify strategic planning opportunities for the Pastoral Team to direct intervention efforts and implement targeted resilience building programs for our students in 2018. We will be surveying our students each year for the next three years to track trends and determine the impact of our programs on raising resilience in our young women across the year levels.

A reading from St Paul's letter to the Philippians

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable - if anything is excellent or praiseworthy - think about such things.

*Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me - put it into practice.
And the God of peace will be with you.*

This reading is from last Sunday's set of readings for mass. In the light of the dreadful event in Las Vegas nearly two weeks ago, St Paul words remind us "whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – it is these things we must stick with, it is where our minds must be.

It is easy and natural to have our spirit weighed down when these terrible things happen and we remember all those who have been effected and ask our loving God to give them strength, courage, and healing. Welcome back to our final term for 2017. Term 4 is always a fast-paced term and we have certainly hit the ground running. Students in Years 7 to 11 have six weeks remaining after this week. Our Year 12s have three weeks of classes before they enter their final exam block.

2017 Speech Night

At this week's assembly, I announced academic award recipients for our 2017 Speech Night. The Speech Night is a wonderful event to recognise student efforts throughout 2017 and will be held on Tuesday, 31 October at the Civic Theatre. Even if students aren't receiving an award or assisting, it is expected that all students attend. On the evening students must be seated by 6.30pm in preparation for a 7.00pm start. All students, whether they are receiving an award or not must be in the College Academic uniform.

Academic Awards announced at the assembly included:

- Merit Award – awarded to students that had a Grade Point Average (GPA) of 10 or better (B- or higher).
- Distinction Award – awarded to students that had a GPA of 12 or better (B+ or higher).
- High Distinction Award – awarded to students that had a GPA of 13 or better (A- or higher).
- Year 11 and 12 Subject Awards - awarded to one student in each Year 11 and 12 subject who received the highest grade in their respective subject.

Students that will receive any of the abovementioned awards on Speech Night were given a letter at this week's assembly. This letter included further details of the Speech Night and rehearsal.

Year 12 Academic Mentoring and Key Dates

Year 12 students have been involved in their final academic mentoring meetings. Such meetings allowed students to discuss their progress in relation to their Overall Position (OP) estimates and their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE). This tracking is based on students' Year 12 academic results until the end of Term 3.

As Year 12 students get closer to their exit, it is important that they are aware of some key dates:

- 15 November 2017 – release of Queensland Core Skills (QCS) Test Result via student connect
- 17 November 2017 – Final Day for Year 12 students.
- 22 November 2017 – Schools will publish Subject Achievement Indicators (SAIs) for students to check.
- 15 December 2017 – The Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) will post all QCEs, Senior Statements, Statements of Results and Tertiary entrance statements to Year 12 students.
- 16 December 2017 – QCAA will publish all Year 12 results and Overall Positions (OPs) via student connect.

It is important that all Year 12 students have logged into their student connect account via <https://studentconnect.qcaa.qld.edu.au/> prior to the dates mentioned above to ensure that they can access their results. Year 12 students will not receive a report card from the College this semester as all of their results are provided in the documents provided by QCAA.

Year 12 Exam Block

Year 12 students will begin their final Exam Block on Monday, 6 November 2017. It is compulsory for Year 12 students to attend these exams and follow the conditions associated with the exam block. Year 12 students are permitted to go home during the Exam Block. 


Section E – Grade 7 and 8 Drawing and Painting - **Ruby Dowling (7)**. First Prize \$100.


Section E - Grade 7 and 8 Drawing and Painting – **Daisha Dow (7)**. Highly Commended.


